#### GOOD FOOD JOBS PROGRAM: ROUND II



The Good Food Jobs Program (GFJP) is a new Youth Action initiative coordinated with the CUNY Center for Urban Food Policy, Seedco, and the Stanley Isaac's Center. We have all joined together to introduce Upper Manhattan youth to jobs in the food economy that have a low barrier to entry and offer opportunities for advancement and good wages. We are now working with our second GFJP cohort who have just completed their fundamental training. Cohort 2 recently demonstrated their new culinary skills and healthy recipes to family and friends before earning their certificates of completion and knife kits. Now, graduates are moving on to internships and getting prepped to start careers in the food sector.
